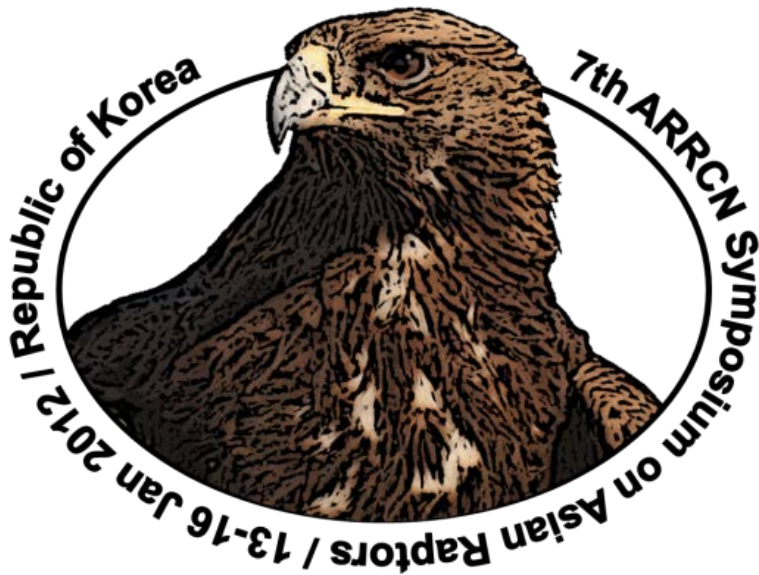

: Raptor Migration and Conservation in Asia

Dear ARRCN members and raptor colleagues,

We are very pleased to announce the 7th ARRCN Symposium on Asian Raptors which will be held on 13~16 January 2012 in the Republic of Korea.

The Republic of Korea (South Korea) is an important wintering ground as well as breeding/staging grounds for diverse raptors such as sparrowhawks, eagles, vultures, and owls. However, habit loss and degradation by the rapid economic growth are threatening raptors, while active plantation lasted more than 40 years successfully regenerated mature forests which were destroyed by the Korean War and overharvested for fuel woods consumption. There are many issues for the conservation of raptors in Korea, but our knowledge and experiences are still limited to resolve those conflicts and problems. We believe that this symposium will be a great chance to encourage communications, to share knowledge and experiences, and to increase public awareness on raptors among Korean researchers, birdwatchers, stakeholders and local managers as well as ARRCN members.

The Migratory Birds Center in the National Park Research Institute prepares to welcome all participants from Asia and the other regions. 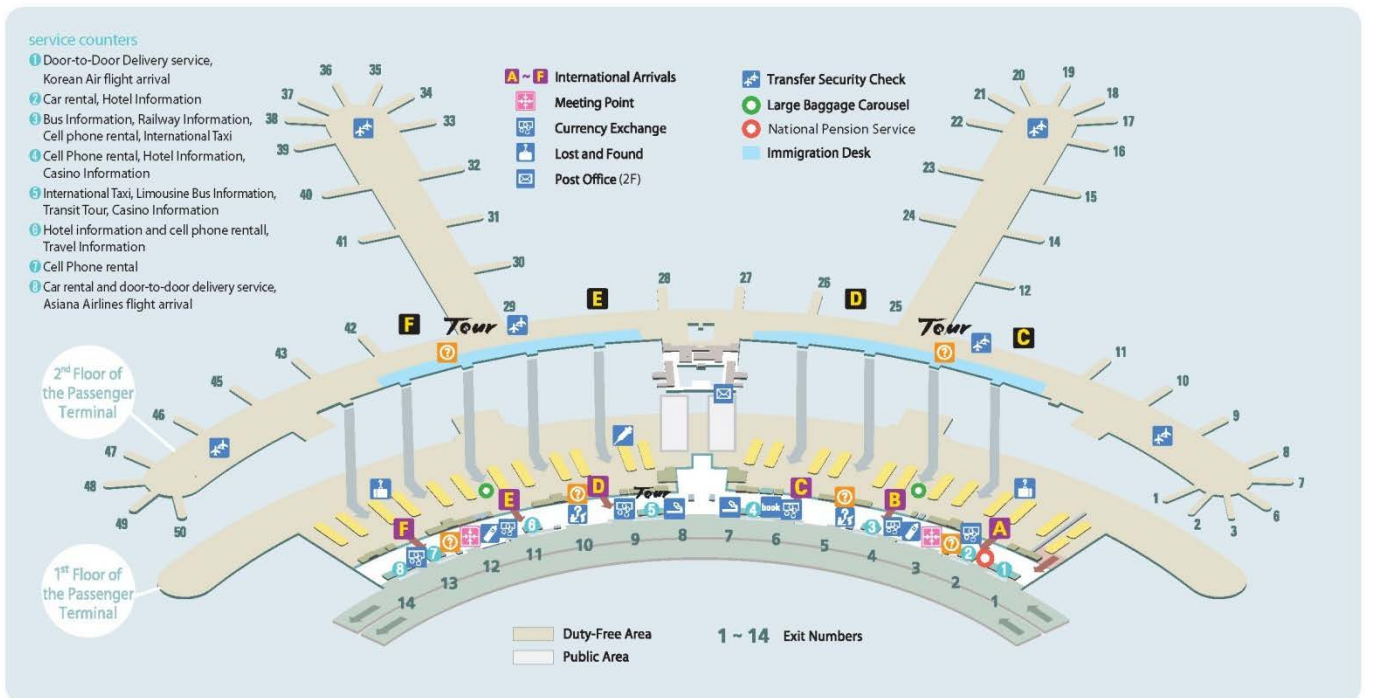
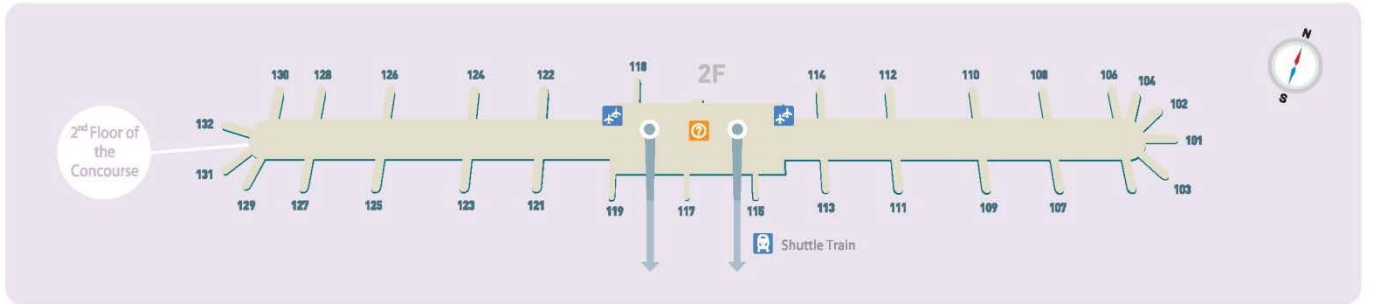

Incheon International Airport: Arrival Area (<http://www.iiac.co.kr/>)

1. If you land the Incheon International Airport (<http://www.iiac.co.kr/>), you will move to the **Arrival Lounge through the Gate A to F.**
2. Volunteers and National Park Officers will wait for you in each gate from 08:00 AM to 23:00 PM on 12 Jan 2012. **Please find the ARRCN logo (see page 41).**
3. There are two meeting points in the lounge, and **our meeting point (marked by a red circle below) is in the western wing** of the lounge. If you want use the shuttle to the venue, please stay at the western meeting point which is **between the Gate E and F (near Exit 12).**

3. Travel to the Venue

The Grace Hill is located approx. 55km away from the Incheon International Airport.

Due to the long distance between the venue and airport, we will pick up all of you basically on 12 Jan. However, we may pick up individuals who arrive on 13 and 14 on request.

However, because some participants did not inform their flight schedule, we may miss the participants. **To use the shuttle or pick-up service, you should inform us your arrival and departure information in advance.**

3.1. Shuttle to Ganghwa (on 12 Jan)

Please make sure that your flight will arrive at Incheon International Airport.

Free Shuttle Buses will be available at the Incheon International Airport in Incheon (but NOT at the Gimpo International Airport in Seoul) on 12 January 2012 and at the Venue in Cheorwon on 17 January 2012.

- On 12 January, shuttle buses to the venue (Grace Hill) in Ganghwa will be available at the Incheon International Airport. Refer the time table below.
- On 16-17 January, return buses to the Incheon International Airport will be available at the Hantan River Spa Hotel in Cheorwon.

3.2. Arrival on 11 Jan

There is no room available in the venue on 11 Jan. Therefore, you need to stay near the airport or in Incheon to take shuttles on 12 January.

3.3. Your own travel to the venue (Ganghwa)

2.3.1. Taxi

- If you miss or do not use the pick-up service, a Taxi is the most convenience way to go to the venue.

- There are two different type of taxi; black one with a yellow cap is a luxury taxi, and other colored ones are normal taxis. You may use a normal taxi.
- Normal Taxi may cost 50,000-70,000 KRW (ca. 45-60 USD) and it usually takes one hour. You can pay by a credit card or cash (KRW), but not by foreign currency.
- If you are asked more fare, you should call to Organizing Committee and ask the taxi driver a (printed) receipt which provides taxi information.
- You may show a taxi driver the following address in Korean language.

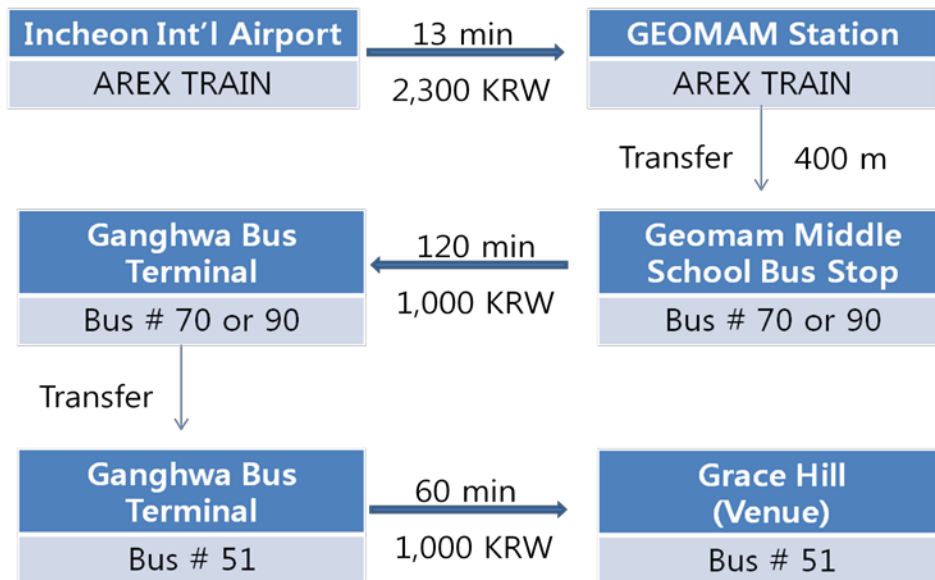


Fig. Main route from the airport to the Grace Hill (ca. 55km)

2.3.2. Other public transportations

- You may use the AREX train from the Incheon International Airport to Geomam Station. Do not use the AREX EXPRESS train which goes to Seoul without any stop. (Korail Airport Railroad, <http://www.arex.or.kr/jsp/eng/main.jsp>)
- Find the Geomam Middle School near the Geomam Station, and use a local bus (#70 or #90, every 40-50 min) heading north to go to the Ganghwa Bus Terminal.
- Use the bus # 51 (every 60 min) at the Bus Terminal, and get off the bus near the Grace Hill.
- You may show a bus driver the above and following cards written in Korean.

4. Travel to the Airport

The Hantan River Spa Hotel in Cheorwon is located approx. 140km away from the Incheon International Airport. It usually takes 2.5-3.0 hours by bus.

We will run three buses to the airport as below:

- 16 Jan 2012 21:00 pm (arrival at 00:00 in Incheon)
 - 17 Jan 2012 07:30 am (arrival at 10:30 in Incheon)
 - 17 Jan 2012 09:00 am (arrival at 12:00 in Incheon)
- If your flight is scheduled BEFORE 12:00 on 17 Jan, you should use the first bus departing at 21:00 on 16 Jan.
 - If your flight is scheduled BETWEEN 12:00 and 13:30 on 17 Jan, you should use the second bus departing at 07:30 on 17 Jan.
 - Other participants who leave LATER THAN 13:30 on 17 Jan, may use the last bus departing at 09:00 on 17 Jan.

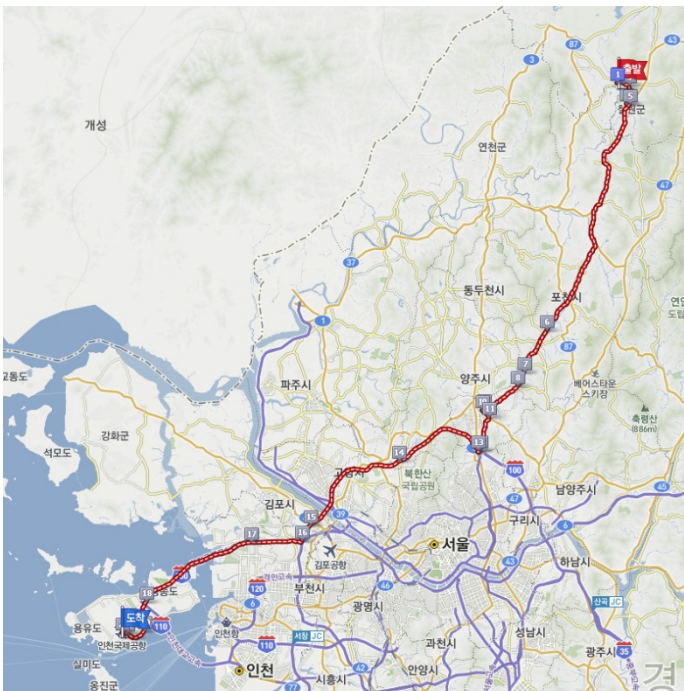


Fig. Main route from the Hantan River Spa Hotel to the airport (ca. 140km)

5. Hotels near the Incheon International Airport

If you arrive on 11 Jan 2012 or If your flight departs before 12:00 on 17 Jan 2012, you have to stay one night near the airport.

These hotels are located within a 250m radius of the Unseo Station (approx 8km away from Incheon International Airport).

If you book your hotel through internet, all hotels may provide a special discount rates on weekdays. Since you will stay in the hotel on weekdays, discounted rates may range KRW 85,000-110,000 (apprx. USD 75-100). If you want to book a room before your departure, please ask registration desk.

5.2. How To Get There

5.2.1. Free Pick-up Service

Each hotel provides free pick-up service. We recommend you to use this free pick-up service. It takes 10 min from the Incheon Airport Station to your hotel.

5.2.2. AREX train

You may use the AREX train (Korail Airport Railroad) at the Incheon International Airport. Do not use the AREX EXPRESS train which goes to Seoul without any stop. It takes 7-8 min and costs KRW 900 or 1,000 (approx 1 USD) from the Incheon Airport Station to Unseo Station. Please refer the website of the AREX (<http://www.arex.or.kr/jsp/eng/main.jsp>).

5.2.3. Local bus

You may use an urban bus (#223) or a luxury seat bus (#203) that departs from EXIT # 5 and 13, Third Floor (Departure level), of Passenger Terminal of Incheon International Airport. It may take 10-15 min and cost KRW 1,000 (approx 1 USD) from the Incheon Airport Station to Unseo Station.

5.2.4. Taxi

You may use a taxi to your hotel or Unseo Station. It may take 10 min and cost KRW 5,000 (no more than KRW 10,000) from the Incheon Airport Station to Unseo Station.

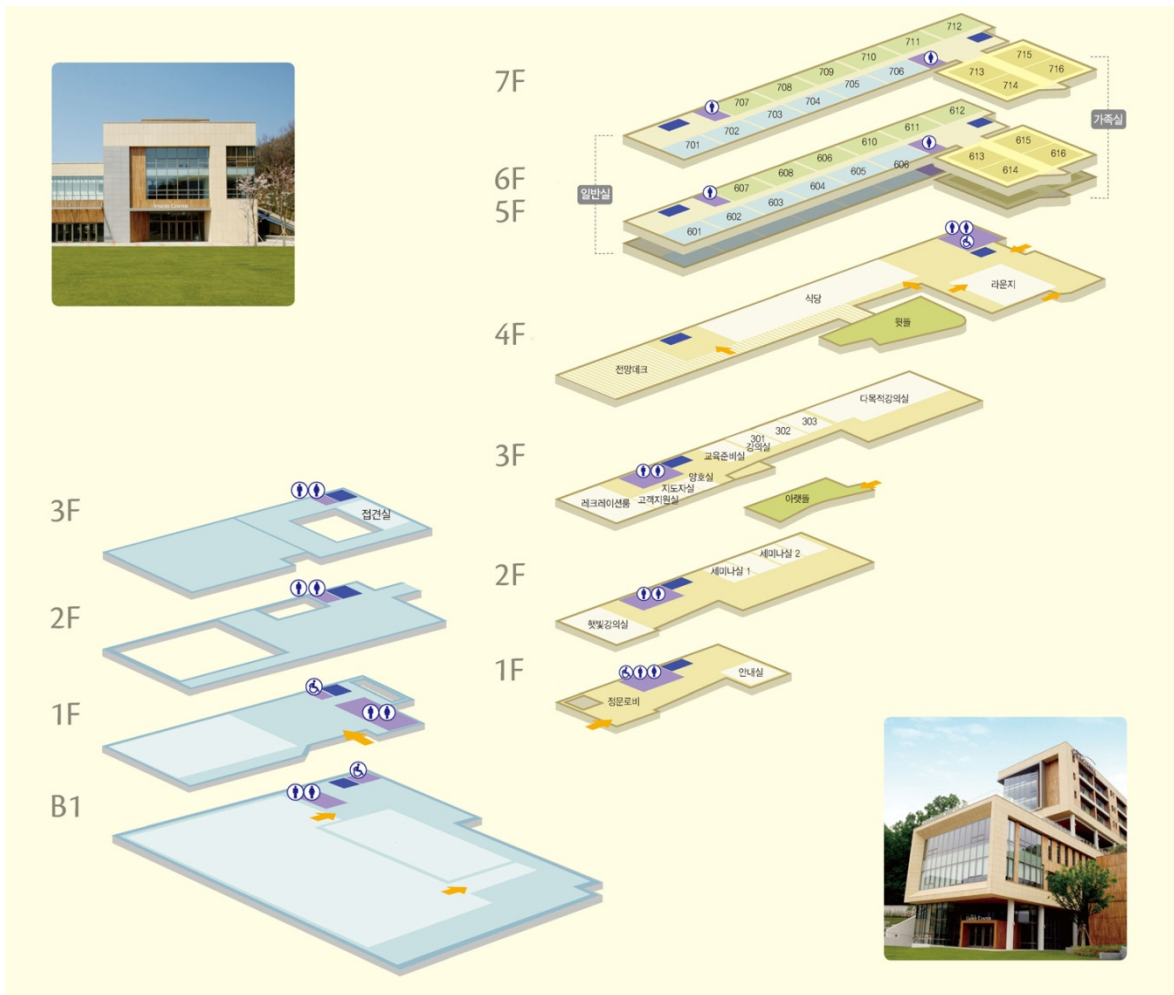

6.3. Registration Fee

6.4. Payment

You may finish the payment for accommodation and registration after your arrival in the venue on 12-13 January 2012. ONLY CASH in USD or in Korean WON will be acceptable.

The time for official registration and payment is 9:00-10:00 AM on 13 Jan, but we recommend you finish your registration as early as possible (even on 12 Jan) to avoid crowdedness.

The Organizing Committee (OC) decided that WIRE TRANSFER for payment is IMPRACTICAL or INACCEPTABLE, because the remittance charge is relatively too high (up to 30% of registration fee) considering the amount of registration fee.

Since the venue is not a true hotel, the OC had to make a group contract for all event packages and already finished the payments. Therefore, **we CAN NOT ACCEPT PAYMENTS using CREDIT CARDS either.** Instead, OC financially supports participants' accommodation to ease the burden of high room rates.

(However, **since we will stay in a hotel on 15-16 Jan, you may pay room charges using credit cards.** Please consult the OC when you register.)

7.3. Instruction for Presentations

7.3.1. Oral Presentation

1. Total time for your presentation is 20 min. Basically, 15 min for presentation and 5 min for Q&A.

3. Please deliver your presentation file (MS Powerpoint Software) to the laptop operator well prior to your session. If you use other software or have movie clips, make sure whether your presentation works well or not.

7.3.2. Poster Presentation

1. The maximum size of your poster is 120*120cm, since the shorter side of poster stand is 120cm in length. Dimension smaller than 120*80cm is recommended for your printed posters.
2. Poster stands and taping (or attaching) materials will be prepared by the Organizing Committee.
3. Please stay near your poster during the Poster presentation session (17:20-18:00 on 13 Jan).

8. Field Trips

1) Official Field Trip

The official field trip is scheduled on 16 January 2012 to visit the DMZ (demilitarized zone between South and North Korea) and adjacent areas (including CCZ: civilian control zone) in Cheorwon County. Because there are lots of military activities for the national security in Cheorwon, the entrance to wintering sites near DMZ without prior permission is prohibited. Given the less human disturbances, Cheorwon is one of the most important wintering sites of migratory waterbirds such as Red-crowned Cranes (*Grus japonensis*), White-naped Cranes (*Grus vipio*), Lesser White-fronted Geese (*Anser albifrons*), and ducks in Korea. Many raptors including Cinereous Vultures (*Aegypius monachus*, more than 500 ind.), White-tailed Sea Eagles, Steller's Sea Eagles, Golden Eagles, Common Buzzards, Hen Harriers, and Kestrels also occur in winter.

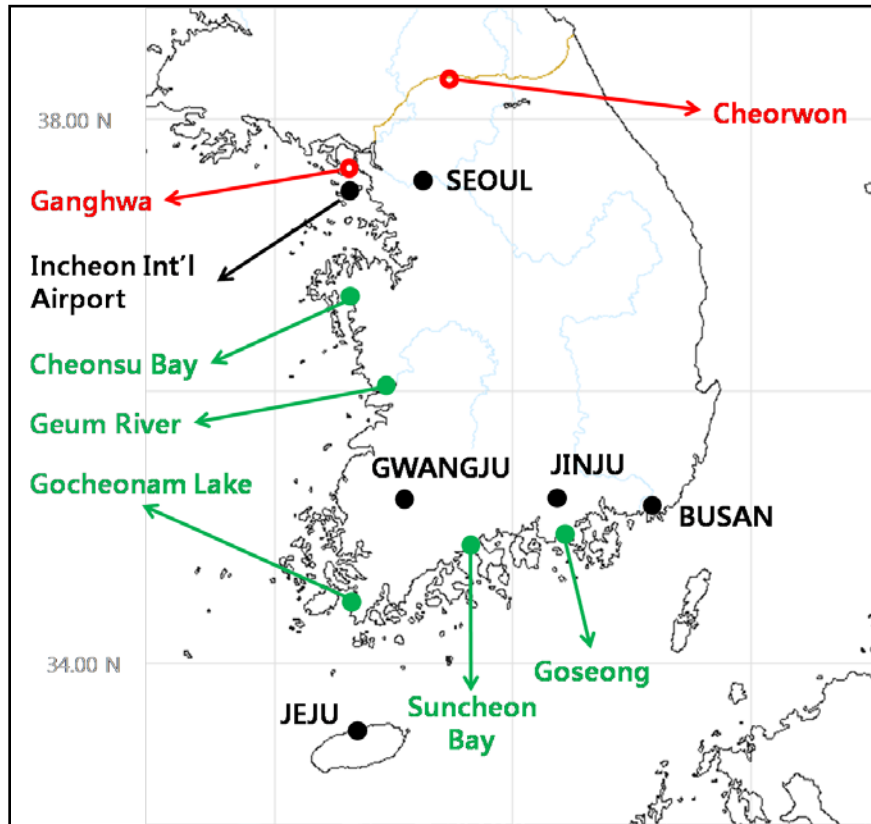

Given the typical Terms of References of such insurances, it should be effective throughout your journey and you have to get it before the departure from your home country. Please contact local or international insurance companies.

If you have specific food requirements or avoidance by physical or religious reasons, please note it on the registration form. If you need to take a medicine, bring it with you. Though most medications are available in Korea, please remember that we will stay in suburban areas and that you may need doctor's prescriptions issued in Korea to buy many kinds of medicines.

9. 4. General Information

Republic of Korea (concise from [Wikipedia](#))

South Korea, officially the Republic of Korea is a sovereign state in East Asia, located on the southern portion of the Korean Peninsula. It is neighbored by the People's Republic of China (Mainland China) to the west, Japan to the east, North Korea to the north, and the East China Sea and Republic of China (Taiwan) to the south. Its capital is Seoul, which is also its largest city. South

Korea lies in a temperate climate region with a predominantly mountainous terrain. Its territory covers a total area of 99,392 km² and has a population of 50 million. Seoul, the capital of South Korea, reaches a population of 11 million.

South Korea occupies the southern portion of the Korean Peninsula, which extends some 1,100 km (680 miles) from the Asian mainland. The country, including all its islands, lies between latitudes 33° and 39°N, and longitudes 124° and 130°E. Its total area is 100,032.00 km² (38,622.57 square miles). South Korea's terrain is mostly mountainous, most of which is not arable. Lowlands, located primarily in the west and southeast, make up only 30% of the total land area. About three thousand islands, mostly small and uninhabited, lie off the western and southern coasts of South Korea.

South Korea tends to have a dry continental climate and a humid subtropical climate, and it has four distinct seasons; spring, summer, autumn and winter. Winters (mid-November to mid-March) can be extremely cold with the minimum temperature dropping below -20 °C in the inland region of the country. Winter temperatures are higher along the southern coast and considerably lower in the mountainous interior. The average annual precipitation varies from 1,370 millimeters (54 inches) in Seoul to 1,470 millimeters (58 inches) in Busan. There are occasional typhoons that bring high winds and floods in summer and autumn.

Currency

At the time of writing (1 Sep 2011), 1 US Dollar (USD) is approximately 1,070 KRW (Korean Won). Major foreign currencies, such as US Dollar and EURO, can be easily exchanged at major banks and airports. However, foreign currency including US Dollars WON'T BE ACCEPTED for day-to-day payments at retail outlets, and thus you need to prepare local currency (Korean WON) for daily expenses. Instead, nearly all shops, restaurants, and hotels ACCEPT credit cards (VISA, Master, etc). Most taxis in Seoul and Incheon area are also equipped with credit card facility. However, it is advisable to check with the driver and carry some Won in cash for backup.

Weather

In January, the Republic of Korea is in winter, and, particularly, the mid-January is the coldest period throughout a year. Sky is usually clear with 60-70% of the relative humidity and <0.1mm daily precipitation, but has some possibility of snowing.

In mid-January, the lowest daily temperature is -5.9 °C and the highest is 1.3 °C in

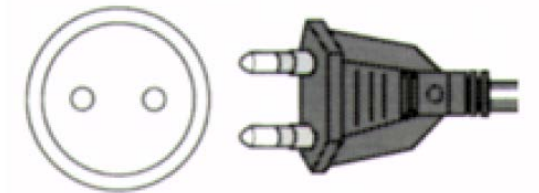
average at Incheon where the Incheon International Airport is located in. However, Cheorwon, where we will stay in, is nearly located in the center of the Korean Peninsula, and thus exhibit harsh climates in winter. The **average daily temperature in Cheorwon ranges from -10.9 to 0.7°C** during 11-20 January.

Generally, indoor areas are well heated in winter. In particular, the electronic/water-based floor-heating system (On-dol in Korean) adopted in all sleeping rooms in Korea is a quite effective heating mechanism against harsh winter climates. However, please bring warm coats and gloves for best protection against cold during outdoors activities.

The organizing committee **will rent winter jackets only to the participants who already requested.**

Electricity

Electricity supply is 220V at 60Hz. Power plug is type C, commonly used in Switzerland, Germany and other west European countries.



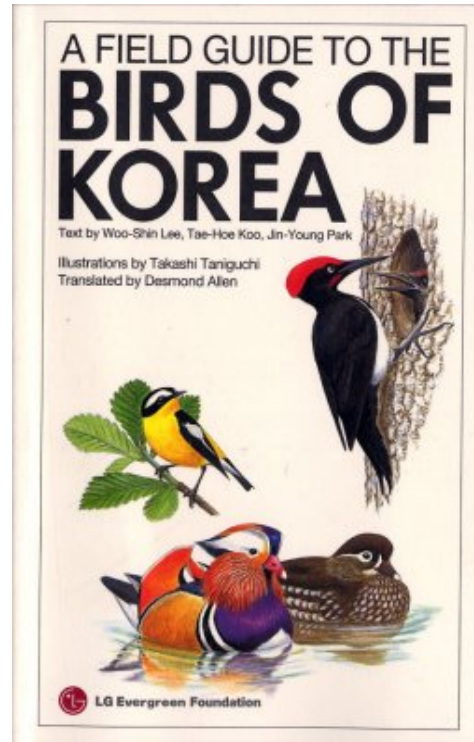
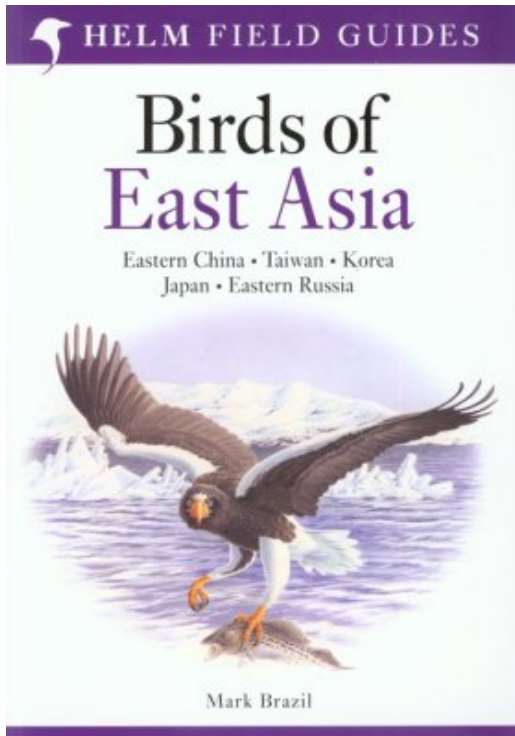
